HOW DID THINGS GET THIS CRAZY?

If that doesn't work, then we resort to physical threats, emotional appeals, or organized protests. Logic and reason have been replaced with public spectacle and name-calling.

BACK TO BASICS

Our founders established no such elite group as having the right to rule. Whether one be a landowner, tradesman, soldier, or even an attorney. Those who rule do so by consent.

CONSENT OF THE GOVERNED

Have you ever considered the implications of this simple phrase? It captures the essential principles of our democracy. That our republic is based upon the consent and participation of those governed. No one has an inherent right to govern, and no one may claim authority over another without their consent.

CONSENT MUST BE VOLUNTARY

There has been many a government in human history that ruled by "forced consent" of its people. Governance should be based on legitimacy, understanding, and consent. Legitimacy comes from free and fair elections, and we all consent to respect the wishes of the majority. Without voluntary consent, governing becomes authoritarian, contradicting the very principles of our republic.

Legitimacy does not come from a law degree nor judicial appointment.

We must always remember that our nation is the "Great Experiment" in self-government. This republic was created by men and can be destroyed by men. It is up to us to be good stewards, to insure that "a government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth." – Abraham Lincoln, 1863.
